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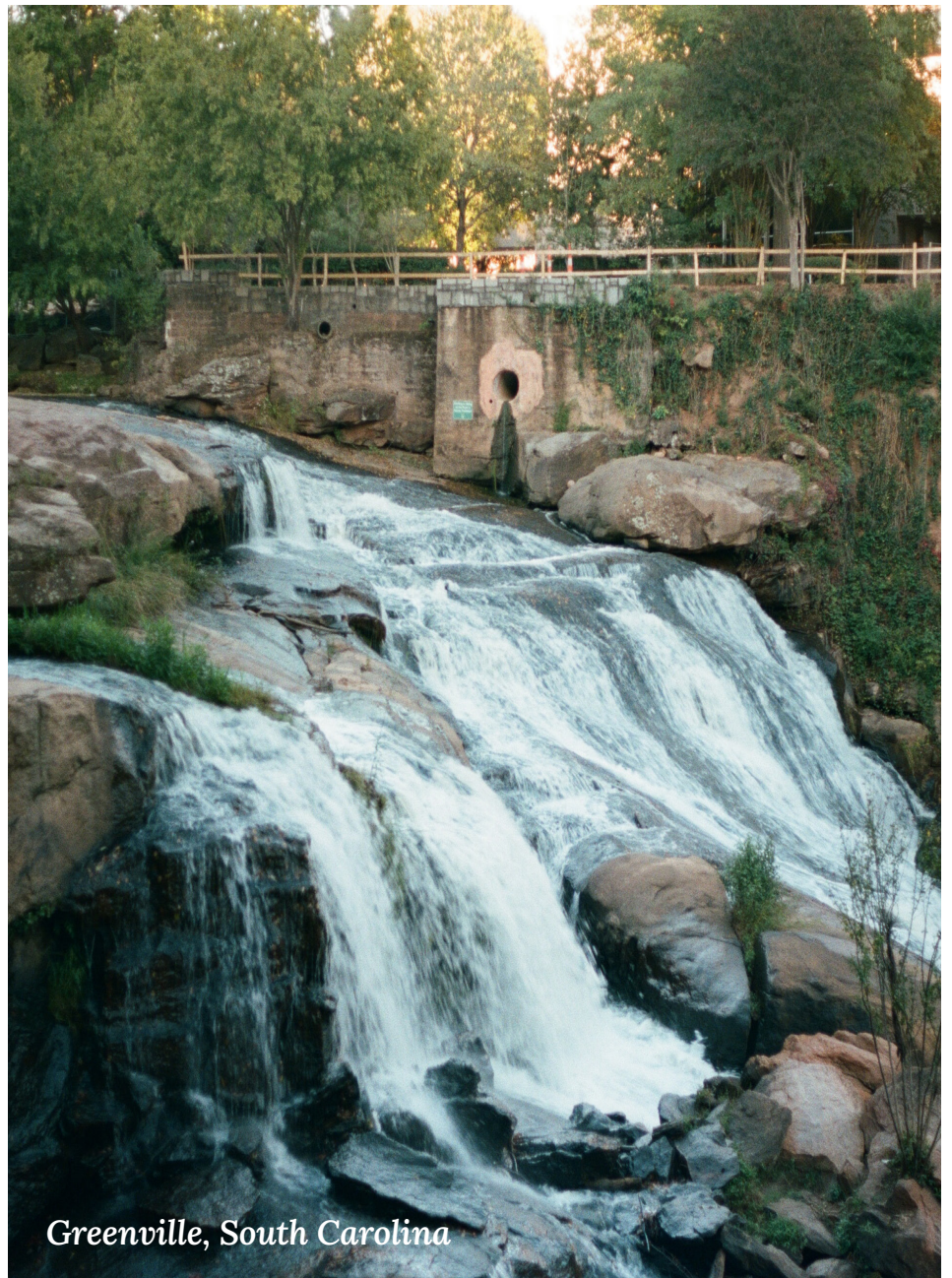
SSCA Past, Present, & Future *Moving Forward With The Association*

Making Diversity and Equity Initiatives a Priority.

Providing Additional Professional Development Opportunities.

Improving Communication.

We recognize the irony of making this a goal for SSCA, but there is more work to be done in strengthening the communication with our membership.

Increasing Revenue for the Association.

SSCA operates on a tight budget, but increasing revenue will afford more opportunities to provide services for members.

Study the Future of our Conference.

After experiencing the benefits of online conferences, we will consider possibilities for enhancing our spring in-person conference.

Finally, in an effort to create a model of accountability in the strategic planning process, we have committed to the following steps:

- Create a task force to continue to develop ideas between strategic planning years and to collect ideas from members
- Report back on strategic plan accomplishments regularly

We have scheduled 50 undergraduate scholars to present their research on 13 panels that will take place on Friday, April 8, and Saturday, April 9. The research presented during the UHC will examine subjects including political rhetoric, persuasion in media and entertainment, interpersonal communication, corporate messages, communication in the classroom, rhetoric and social movements, communication and identity, and advertising appeals. Everyone is welcome to attend the UHC panels and participate in the conversations that the UHC scholars are initiating.

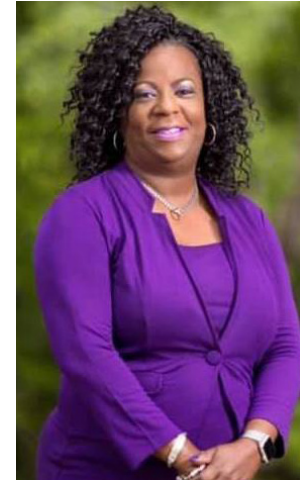

Moreover, we are tackling deep issues of systemic oppression vis-à-vis racism in an effort to further demonstrate the practical relevancy of the transformative work that we do.

SPOTLIGHT PANELS

- **UHC Alumni Reunion Panel: “The Resilience and Practicality of Scholarship”** is a panel reuniting alumni to discuss their experiences with UHC and how it has impacted them
- **“This Land is Their Land: The Issue of Land Acknowledgement, History, Social Justice, and Identity Politics”** will address both the symbolic and material ways that Land Acknowledgements impede and facilitate interracial dialogue and local efforts to address the interconnectedness of Land Acknowledgement, local history, social justice, and identity politics in relation to Cherokees and the local community of Greenville.
- **“Greenville’s Racist and Reparative Landscape”** focuses on monuments, the state’s Heritage Act, and the tensions regarding visual rhetoric and racial injustice.
- **“Extending the Reach of Resilience: Regionalizing the Black Caucus - SSCA Edition”** will identify strategies toward galvanizing Black membership and participation in and at SSCA; improving regional policies and practices that benefit scholars and graduate students of color and creating a SSCA division or interest group dedicated to the scholarship, service, and support of Africana Communication and scholars.
- **“Rhetorics of Resilience and Resistance in South Carolina’s Civil Rights Struggle”** focuses on the three phases of South Carolina’s rhetorical struggle: the construction of a culture of segregation, resilient Black activism that sought to overthrow that culture, and White Christian resistance to the Civil Rights Movement. The interactive nature of this will lead to fruitful conversation between and among panelists and audience members about the issues raised by the papers presented.
- **“Form in the Crucible of Resistance: Examining the Black Rhetoric and Public Address Tradition”** highlights Black rhetorical and oratorical traditions through powerful sermons, speeches, and spoken word performances.

As you can see, we have so much to look forward to in Greenville, SC. The conference is an opportunity for us to reconnect, reenergize, and recalibrate as we adapt to new ways for engaging in communication scholarship. I remain hopeful for and about all of the possibilities on the horizon!

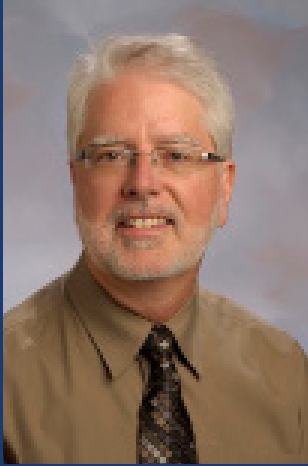
