SENIOR SCHOLAR SPOTLIGHT SSCA: Memories and Meanings

SSCA is the source of some of my fondest professional memories. One of those memories goes back to 1961, when I made my first presentation at an SSCA convention in Miami. I was 23 years old, and had been in a doctoral program at the University of Florida for only a year. But someone—perhaps my mentor Douglas Ehninger?—had maneuvered to get me on a blue-ribbon panel.

I was clearly out of my depth. I remember that one of the participants was Ted Clevenger, future dean at Florida State University, fine scholar in his own right, and an all around good fellow. Later, Southern would name its Undergraduate Honors program for him. Critic for the Miami program was Waldo Braden of LSU, the lion of Southern speech. Waldo had established South-



ern public address as a respectable, focused field for critical study. At that time our field had a "great speakers and speeches" emphasis, focused on the public oration. This young fellow at Wisconsin, Lloyd Bitzer, had written a provocative essay that encouraged closer attention to the reasoned structure of these speeches. Since I had just completed a program in literary studies, Ehninger encouraged my counter interest in what we originally called the symbolic nature of speaking, how speeches can draw upon the myths, popular beliefs, and civic emotions of listeners. This interest soon came to focus on how powerful metaphors can influence how speakers and audiences interact. This convention presentation was my first effort to plot out a direction for this study, and Waldo's critical suggestions did much to move the project forward. This early convention of Southern and the many since have helped me in so many ways.

The programs they featured and the informal conversations they made possible have kept me informed about the changing, expanding horizons of our field. I have witnessed the growing richness of our scholarship, and have traced the emerging importance of questions concerning human communication that challenge us in our time. We return to our home colleges and universities inspired to grow and lift the importance of what we do in our professional and civic communities. Our conventions encourage us to teach more effectively and to research more productively. Our highly respected SSCA journal helps us find audiences within and across disciplines.

From the beginning for me, Southern has been a place to come home to. Its conventions have offered sites for enduring friendships, for enjoyable experiences that continue to grow in hilarity as we recall them to each other every year. I suspect that we Southerners hug more than other regional associations! Susie and I are so honored that the Southern would name its concluding convention reception for us. That moment, we believe, has become a celebration of all the great professional and personal meaningfulness that Southern makes possible. It is always a happy occasion. So, join us in a toast:

Long live the Southern States Communication Association!
