CONVENTION PRE-REGISTRATION

Pre-Registration Deadline is March 5



Plenary sessions to focus on 'Little Rock Nine,' history of city

s the finishing touches are being added to the Little Rock program, I would like to encourage you all to attend the 81st Annual Southern States Communication Association's convention.

Little Rock is a wonderful city with lots of interesting places to visit.

In addition Little Rock is also the home of the William J. Clinton Presidential Library, the Governor's Mansion, the Capitol Buildings, and Heifer International.

The theme for the 2011 convention is "Traditions, Trends, and Technology" and there are many submissions related to this theme for the convention.

The plenary sessions were also selected based on the significance of the history of Little Rock specifically referencing the "Little Rock Nine." Dr. John A. Kirk from University of Arkansas at Little Rock will discuss the 1957 Little Rock School Crisis.

Dr. Kirk's research focuses on the history of the civil rights movement in the United States, the South, and Arkansas, and the history of post-New Deal Southern politics, society and culture.

He has won a number of awards for his research including the F. Hampton Roy Award (1993) from the Pulaski County Historical Association, and the Walter L. Brown Award (1994), the J. G. Ragsdale Book Award (2003), and the Lucille Westbrook Award (2005) from the Arkansas Historical Association.

A second plenary session will be an interview with Minnijean Brown Trickey a Member of the Little Rock Nine. Dr. Trickey is one of nine African-American

students who collectively resisted the opposition to desegregation and entered Little Rock Central High School in 1957 with protection from federal troops.

This setting provides an opportunity to look back at history as well as to consider what trends still need to be altered to realize goals related to achieving "liberty and justice for all."

Finally, our Awards Luncheon speaker will be Dr. Sandra Petronio. Petronio is a Professor in the Department of Communication Studies at Indiana University-Purdue University, Indianapolis and Core Faculty in the Indiana University Center for Bioethics in the School of Medicine.

She is also an adjunct faculty in the IU School of Nursing and the IU School of Informatics. Petronio's area of research is in privacy, disclosure, and confidentiality.

During the last 25 years, she has developed the "Communication Privacy Management" theory, which is detailed in her book "Boundaries of Privacy: Dialectics of Disclosure."

This book has won the Gerald R. Miller Award from the National Communication Association in 2003 and the 2004 IARR book award from the International Association of Relationship Research.

This convention offers us an opportunity to discuss how Traditions, Trends, and impact of Technology influence each of our divisions and interest groups.

I am looking forward to seeing all of you in Little Rock.
